**PAUL M. TURNEAURE, Member #7** "Yakima, WA –Paul M. Turneaure, 88, went home to be with his Lord and Savior, Thursday March 6, 1997.

Paul was born in Yakima, Washington on August 11, 1908, to Clifton Bradley Turneaure and Edith L. (Miltimore) Turneaure. He was raised and received his education in Yakima, graduating from Yakima High School and Yakima Valley College.

On September 7, 1935, he was married to Vivien Cleman in Yakima. Paul was a civil engineer, employed by the Bureau of Reclamation for thirty-one years until he retired in 1970.

Paul was an active member of Westminster Presbyterian Church. He was Secretary-Treasurer of the Yakima Engineers Club for many years. He made the maps displayed on the covers of the Yakima Valley Genealogical Society Quarterly Bulletins for eighteen years. He was also a member, until recently, of the American Guild of Organists. He served as a Boy Scout leader for many years and was a charter member of the Yakima Amateur Radio Club.

Survivors include his wife, Vivien Turneaure of Yakima; two daughters, Elizabeth Ann Shoemaker and husband, Bernard, of Kennewick, Washington, and Dorothy Jean Morales of Yakima; one son, John Paul Turneaure and wife Brigitte of Palo Alto, California; six grandchildren and eleven great-grandchildren...."

A memorial service was held Saturday, March 22<sup>-1997</sup>, at 3:00 P.M. at the Westminster Presbyterian Church. Vivien explained that the service was postponed so that their son, John, who had a quadruple bypass surgery before Paul's stroke, would be well enough to attend. Paul is closely related by family and friendship to many members of the Maybee Society and when Alice McDowell, #6, provided us with a Compendium of the Descendants of Reverend Daniel Mabie, Paul prepared an index for it. We extend our sympathy to Vivien and the other family members, at this time of separation.

### **DE BRENNER DID IT AGAIN!!**

Reunions of the Mabee Mabie Maybee family in Florida have become a regular affair, and, after reading and hearing glowing descriptions of the events, my husband, Bob; my brother, Bill; his wife, Zina, and I decided to cross the country to see for ourselves. We were not disappointed. Our hostess at the Kingsway Country Club, Port Charlotte, Florida, was De Brenner, #101, and she had carefully crafted each detail. Even maps were sent out in advance to guide those of us, who were strangers to the area. We entered a beautifully decorated dining room. De had paid careful attention to the tables, and, to honor the season she had made panoramic sugar eggs as table decorations. For each participant she had prepared a special souvenir booklet giving the names, ancestries and relationships of those in attendance. On the cover of the booklet was a photo of the painting. The Mabie Children, which is now the property of the National Museum of American Art, Smithsonian Institution, Washington, D. C. De not only had made copies of the photograph for all of those of us there (there were over 50 in attendance) but she had searched and researched to help us understand the painting, the artist, the donor, and the children who were portrayed. Also in the booklet was a tribute to Sour Dough Jack Mabee. Just before his death, he fulfilled his dream of attending the reunion, seeing the Mabee Farm and visiting friends on the East Coast.

After a greeting from De, the staff served each of us our choice of Chicken Cardonay, broiled salmon or prime rib. The celebration included fellowship, family friendships and food. Members told a little about themselves and their branches of the family. It was so exciting to meet so many with whom I have been corresponding. De also had made arrangements for a "sharing table" where Items of the interest were displayed including photos of ancestors, documents from the various branches of the family, books by Hamilton Wright Mabie and genealogies. Also of interest were enlargements of the faces of the children from the painting, *The Mabie Children*. How similar they are to faces of some Mabie children today.

I lingered long over this table, and wished I could carry some of the materials home to share with you. You will be happy to know that wishes do come true. ### MABEE FAMILY PAPERS

"The Mabee Family Papers, a part of George Franchere's gift to the Schenectady County Historical Society, comprises almost 600 items. This collection includes deeds, wills, letters, inventories, legal documents of many kinds, bills for sale of slaves, and receipts for a wide variety of purchases. The existence of this collection of family papers will be an invaluable aid to the Society as we work to develop interpretive programs for the farm. It is the personal stories, the vignettes from the lives of those who lived at the farm, that bring history to life. These stories are the implements that we will use to transform the farm into a living history museum.

The collection has been microfilmed, making it readily available to anyone interested in learning more about the Mabee family and farm. The Microfilm and a finding aid *An Introduction to the Mabee Family Papers*, are located in the Grems-Doolittle Library at the (Schenectady County Historical) Society."

# \$50,000 CHALLENGE AND OPPORTUNITY FOR THE MABEE FARM

"New York State, through its Environmental Protection Fund, has awarded a \$50,000 matching grant to the Schenectady County Historical Society for work at the Mabee Farm. What an extraordinary opportunity we now have to move ahead with our vision of a vibrant farm museum, with its unique buildings returned to their original strength and beauty.

This opportunity, however, comes with a tremendous challenge. In order to receive the entire \$50,000 from the state, the Society must raise the matching amount. The Friends of the Mabee Farm membership drive has given us a firm foundation of funds to build on, but a foundation is just that, a beginning. We need to raise many more dollars to match this grant.

This funding opportunity comes at a critical time. We must accomplish certain basic tasks in order for the Mabee Farm project to move forward. The three existing buildings desperately need stabilization and repair. To continue eligibility for additional grant funding, we must publish an Historic Structure Report. In addition, we must complete an archaeological survey before the ground is disturbed by any construction work. The cost of these crucial steps is estimated to exceed \$100,000.

The challenge is great. Our ability to meet the challenge of this \$50,000 grant will determine whether the Mabee Farm project moves forward in a timely manner or languishes, risking further deterioration of these extraordinary buildings. Surely this challenge is worth our best efforts."

### **BETHSHEBA MAIBEE**

Through the Internet, Cindy Bryant learned that Susan Godlewski has been searching for, and trying to identify, the family of her grandmother's grandmother, Charlotte Louseberry/Lounsbury Hayes (1834 NY - 1909 NY). Charlotte's death record in Peekskill, NY, lists her parents as Abraham Lockwood of NY and Maria Lounsberry of NY. The Couch Files at the Field Library in Peekskill, NY, lists the ten children family of John Lockwood (b. 1771) of Putnam Valley, NY, who married Bethsheba Maibee. Their son Abraham married a Lounsbury. The Couch files did not list the children of this marriage. Susan therefore has asked us to publish this query. "I am seeking information on Bethsheba /Bathsheba Mabie, wife of John Lockwood (b. ca. 1771, NY) of Putnam Valley, NY, and on her father, Abraham Maibee of Yorktown, NY. I am seeking information on two possible candidates for her father:

Abraham Mabie (b. 1763, Carmel, NY), son of Abraham and Sarah (Gates) Mabie, married Content This couple had five children, including a daughter, born ca. 1790/1800 according to the book, 6000 New York Ancestors: a Compendium of Mabie Research by R. Robert Mutrie, (#23). There is no information on the name of this child. I would like to identify this girl.

Abraham Mabie, (christened Oct. 17, 1732, in Sleepy Hollow Church), son of Jeremias (AKA Jeremyas/ Jeremyah, Maby/Mebie/Meebi/Mabee) and his second wife, Annatie Van Amburgh Brower, according to information in the Couch Files in the Field Library, Peekskill, NY. No other information has been found. I would like to identify his spouse and children, if any." SUSAN GODLEWSKI

Frank's sister, Luella (Mabie) Brodie shared the following information with us -- "He had been bad for quite awhile. He was in the hospital for a week or so and then came home. His children took care of him. He was on oxygen when he got home. He was 73 this past November 19<sup>th</sup>. He has been suffering for many years with only part of a lung. He was deaf, which made it hard for him, so he didn't go places very often. He was in the army in the 40's and 50's. He was stationed in Germany, Wisconsin and other states. He had pneumonia there and it left him with bad lungs."

### WATER WATER EVERYWHERE

Bianca Krall, #82, and her family had the experience of being flooded by the excess of water in the Pacific Northwest. At one point, the water exceeded nine feet in the back yard and three feet in the front. For several weeks the only access to the house was by wading or carefully trudging down a narrow bridge constructed by her husband, Kevin. To make matters worse, she attended a meeting at the Courthouse to discuss the water problems and they turned the down the building's lights before she left. In the dim light, she fell on the stairs and badly sprained an ankle, making the trip down their 6 inch by 100 foot bridge, on crutches, impossible. She would have been a prisoner in her home, but her husband carried her in and out; and a neighbor towed Bianca and children in and out house by boat. For a while they were forced to move away from their home. In April, the water became so high that the temporary bridge floated away. This time, friends replaced it with a sturdier bridge. The water is slowly receding.

## GENEALOGIES OF THE PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND MABEYS

Patrick Burke, an avid genealogist and correspondent (by e-mail) of Ross Mabey, #202, shared the following information with us and has asked for our help.

"The genealogies of the Prince Edward Island(PEI), Canada. Mabeys is given in some detail in *An Island Refuge(AIR)* edited by Orlo Jones and Doris Haslam and published by the Abegweit Branch of the United Empire Loyalist Association of Canada in 1983. This is a great source for the genealogies of Loyalist families of PEI although complete documentation is not given. George Mabey appears on pp. 171-174. I can transcribe a bit of this reference for you here:

George Mabey (b. ca. 1755, apparently in Dorsetshire, England) was in New York prior to the Revolution based on the report that he was in the 17th Regiment of Light Dragoons in New York during November 1776. His name first appears in the Musters of the regiment on 1 Feb 1777, listing him as a private in Captain Elliston's company. During the next four years he received a number of promotions and transfers: on August 5, 1777, he was promoted to corporal in Major Crewe's company; on July 18, 1780, he was transferred to Captain Talbot's company; and on January 16, 1781, he was promoted to sergeant in the Colonel's company. The final appearance of his name was on the Musters in July 29, 1783. He next appears in PEI as a Loyalist settler with his wife in Bedeque, PEI (Lot 19) and they were granted 200 acres in Lot 26. His wife Mary (b. ca. 1760, d. 1837) is believed to have been nee Hamilton (I have wondered if she was connected to the Alexander Hamilton) but this has not been documented to my knowledge. George and Mary later moved to Charlottetown, PEI, sometime before 1801. George was a road overseer for Lot 25-29 and was appointed adjutant to Shuttleworth's Foresters. He also was granted a tavern license in Charlottetown in 1798. George died on 4 Mar 1848. Both he and Mary are buried in the Elm Ave. Cemetery in Charlottetown. George and Mary probably had twelve children. Only ten are given in AIR. I am a descendant of their son Cornelius Mabey (1792-1880) and his wife Mary Maria Sentner (1799-1887). The latter couple had ten children. My ancestor, born to this couple was George Mabey (1833-?; AIR says b. 1821) who married Martha Gass (b. ?, d. ?). The fate of George and Martha is unknown, but they may have died relatively young as my great grandmother, their daughter Mary Stukely Mabey, was reported to have been an orphan. Mary S. Mabey was b. in 1859 on PEI and died in 1934 in Portland, OR. She and her husband, John Edward Burke (1860-1946), my great grandfather, came to Portland in 1883 with John's parents and his siblings. My connection with the Mabey family ends with Mary S. Mabey.

That is a thumbnail sketch of what I know. The major puzzles to solve from my point of view are: (1) Where was George Mabey actually born in England and who were his ancestors? (2) Was George's wife's surname Hamilton or something else? Where were they married? New York? (3) Was George related to the Mabey family (ies) in New England prior to the Revolution? (4) What was the fate of George Mabey (b. 1833) and Martha Gass? When did they die? Where are they buried? (5) How are the Mabeys or Hamiltons connected to the Stukely/Stukley family of England, if at all?

Belva, if you could shed any light on these puzzles, I would be grateful. And let me know if I can be of help to you or your members. I will do my best to answer any questions you or they may have on my branch of the Mabeys." PATRICK L. BURKE

"We have had a busy winter. On January 6<sup>th</sup> I agreed to speak at the Haldimand Branch Ontario Genealogical Society on how I found my Mayflower ancestors - a complete surprise to me in 1973. After I had made arrangements for the 6<sup>th</sup>, we learned that my husband would have to be in London University Hospital on the 7<sup>th</sup> for surgery on the 8<sup>th</sup>. I would like Certificates for as many as I can, so that our family will be documented! So far, I only have John Secord Sr.

In April we go back to London, and in May my husband has to see his eye doctor and have a cataract removed. I also agreed to speak at the Norfolk Branch OGS meeting. I'm not a speaker as such, but they assured me it was a small group. I guess The Mayflower is one of my favorite subjects."

August 3, 1742 (St. Mary's, Portsea, Hants, England), he married Hannah Martin. It is believed that Harry died in Portsea, in late July of 1776. Their son, John Maybee (bapt. Sep. 2, 1744; St. Mary's Portsea), was my six times great grandfather. The Maybee family remained in and about Portsea for a number of generations, but by the early/mid 1800's they had settled in Kent (Sheerness and Chatham), England. The Maybees were involved with work to do with the sea, although Harry Maybee (1720) was a tailor. The generations after John Maybee (1744-1816) include the following: Harry Maybee (1776-???), Samuel Robert Maybee (1804-1885); Samuel Robert Maybee, Jr. (1830-1890) and Elizabeth Mary Maybee (1848-1932; she married John Clarke, in 1865; they lived in Chatham, Kent). Elizabeth Mary (Maybee) Clarke was my paternal grandmother's paternal grandmother. I would be most interested to hear from anyone who has done research into the English branch of the Maybee family."
