"Donald William Johnson M.A. B. ED., U.E. of Scarborough, Ontario, Canada, passed away peacefully after a brief illness, Feb. 15, 1998, in his 81st year. He was the son of Allie (Orr) and the late Will Johnson, and his Maybee connection came through his father's line. Beloved husband of Kathryn (Tiller), father of Peter and his wife, Angela (Walt) of Scarborough, and Holly and her husband Peter (Belcham) of Scarborough. Beloved Grandfather of Clarissa, Philip, Meredith and Laney Johnson, and brother of Keith of Frankford, Ontario. He was predeceased by his father Will and an infant son, both in 1955.

Don was a graduate of Queen's University, Kingston, Ontario, and the University of Toronto. He began a long teaching career in 1938 in Prince Edward Co., Ontario, with a break from 1943 to 1946 when he served Overseas with the Royal Canadian Army Medical Corps, No. 3 Canadian General Hospital. After the war he joined the Toronto Board of Education and retired in 1980 as an Assistant Area Superintendent. He was born Nov. 29, 1917, on the family farm, Murray Tp, Northumberland Co., Ontario, an area recently amalgamated into 'Quinte West'. His grandmother was Clarissa Ann (Maybee) Johnson 1843-1953, and he inherited his looks from the Maybee side of the family. Indeed he looked very much like his ancestor Robert Maybee 1835-1919, except that his ancestor had a long beard! Don was a descendant of

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Capt. Abraham Maybee UE. the Loyalist. A memorial service was held in Scarborough on Feb 21, 1998. Cremation was followed by interment in the Stockdale Cemetery, north of Trenton, Ontario, where many of his Maybee ancestors and relations are buried. Submitted by Peter Johnson."

ARMY FINDS WALLET FROM 1953 THEFT

Dublin, California – Forty-four years ago, Air Force 2nd Lt. Robert Mabey gave up for gone his birth certificate, his life savings and his lucky four-leaf clover. All were the contents of his genuine-leather, cowboy style, wallet, which became a causality of a midnight break-in at Camp Parks. The theft occurred in 1953 while basic trainees were out on combat training.

Robert Mabey, now 66, has retired and lives in Logan, Utah. He had long since forgotten about his wallet until last week until he answered his phone and heard an Army police officer in Dublin, California, saying they had found his wallet.

'After 44 years, I never expected that' said Mabey who had a 25 year Air Force career. 'Then I started to recall everything. I was just a young lad and all the money I ever had ... was in that wallet.'

On Veteran's Day, contractors demolishing the old barracks came upon two wallets safely hidden in a latrine wall. Neither contained any cash, but both had their owner's identification." Patricia Magette, #91, sent us this news story.

Two sets of books, comprised of many volumes and based on a variety of reliable sources, were called to our attention because of the vast wealth of information they contained. A more detailed listing of the contents of the individual volumes is available, free, from Heritage Books, Inc., for those who are interested.

VISITATION OF ENGLAND AND WALES is composed of 21 volumes of genealogical information which was gathered from the Herald's visitations of the 16th and 17th centuries. The fourteen volumes of Notes 1896-1921 contain English and Welsh Pedigrees and supporting documentation directly keyed to the Visitation series. Within the pages of these volumes are transcripts of wills, land records, parish registers, family bible entries, copies of monumental brasses. Illustrations include church and book plates, arms on record at the college of arms, autographs, seals and portraits. We know the work of Heralds was taken very seriously and great efforts were made to insure accuracy. Edited by Joseph Jackson Howard, LLD, Maltravers Herald Extraordinary and Frederick Arthur Crisp. The reprints range in cost from \$30 to \$40 per volume and Notes range in price from \$27 to \$39 plus \$4 shipping and handling. FRAGMENTA GENEALOGICA is a 13 volume English genealogical information, collection of compiled by Arthur Crisp, from a variety of sources such as Munimenta Antiqua, apprentice books, will books, church records, and historical documents. The series contains fewer illustrations than the Notes of the Visitation series, but it gives a wider cross section of the people. The original volumes were beautifully printed on Crisp's private press in limited editions of 50. The reprints are now available from Heritage Books, Inc. and range from \$21 to \$23. The volumes were published from 1894 to 1909, average 125 pages, 8.5x11, illustrated, paperback, indexed. For further ordering instructions, see above. Volume 11 is unique in that it is exclusively devoted to marriage settlements (also called "indentures"). There are more than 400 marriage settlements from all over England, mostly from the 1600's and 1700's but some as old as the 1500's and some as late as the 1800's. 

WE ARE CHEERING FOR HIM

Doug Fisher will race to Cuba in a 51 foot boat during May 1998. He is the son of William and Joyce (Mabee) Fisher and the grandson of Royal A. Mabee. I thought that his family might be concerned because of the volatile political situation there, but his father had participated in an earlier race to Cuba; and he assured me that the people there were very gracious. The officials had even removed their shoes before boarding the boats.

DAVID HORTON VAN ORDEN Alias C. W. Whirlwind -- Better Known as Dave

"Almost midnight, December 31st, Sarah Ellen M. Van Orden gave birth to her second son, a dear little fellow with blue eyes and red hair. Now this was not in a modern hospital with doctors, nurses and sterilized equipment. It happened in a simple little homemade dwelling of the first settlers of 'Poverty Flats', later to be the city of Lewiston, Utah. The winters there were cold and severe with howling blizzards and drifting snow. There were no gas furnaces, no bathroom facilities--not even a 'fridge, or a dishwasher, or a microwave, or a television, or a water bed. This was in the days of pioneering, the covered wagon days. The people lived almost entirely off the land they owned. A trip to the country store would be to buy a gallon of coal oil for the lamp and maybe some beans. No standing in line at the supermarket--oh no--they milked the cow, baked the bread, churned the butter, salted down the pork. Dave could remember borrowing and lending coals of fire. Matches were hard to get. There was no last minute shopping at the Mall for Christmas. Instead they sat up late to knit the last half of a mitten, or to frill a dress on a homemade doll.

In those days babies wore really long dresses for a few months, probably because of the cold. Then they were 'shortened'. That meant they were put into dresses that came just to their feet. Little boys wore these dresses for several years before being put in Dave could remember wearing these dresses. That accounted for him often jokingly saying, 'When I was a little girl ' He related that one day when he was four years old and wearing a dress he was jumping on a plank across a puddle and fell into the mud. While they washed and dried his dress he had to wear some of his older brother Will's pants. He refused to wear the dresses after that. The year he was five his mother had fixed some Christmas things. The kids got into them. Ma said, 'never again', and she never did.

Dave often told about making out a meal on watercress and bread and milk. The story was told about ten potatoes for seed. Ma wanted one to make yeast but Pa said 'No'. The eyes were each cut in four pieces and planted. They raised four bushels of potatoes.

Pa was always sick. He had a stroke when Dave was less than two years old. They had to keep the room darkened and keep quiet. Because of this - Dave started school early. School cost one dollar and fifty cents each semester. The kids would change off going because there wasn't enough money for everyone. Dave liked school. He studied hard and enjoyed learning. He got through the McGuffey's Fifth Reader. He wanted to go to the academy so he worked hard all summer and gave the money to Ma to keep for him. When he asked her for it she had used it all for the girls. They hadn't had as much schooling as he had. So he went back to work and he never got any more schooling. But he continued to study throughout his life.

Dave was one in a family of seven children. Times were hard. They seldom, if ever, had sugar in the house. His mother dried currents and service berries. She cooked them together in the wintertime because they were sweeter that way. On special occasions honey candy was made. They always had milk and cream and butter. His father always kept enough horses so that he could sell one if they got in a pinch for money. His mother would pull wool off dead sheep, wash and card it, weave it and knit it into stockings, sweaters and mittens for the family. She also made warm wool quilts.

Will always wanted to take a lunch to school but he didn't want to carry it. The lunch was bread and gravy in a rag sack. Dave didn't want to take it but was always made to carry it. So one day he dumped it in the snow. He never had to carry it anymore. ...

His sisters said there were many things they never would have had if it hadn't been for Dave. They tell of going to bed Christmas Eve knowing there would be no presents because of what their mother had said, and waking up Christmas morning finding dolls for the little girls and peanuts for all; and they said to each other, 'Dave did that.'

Colin was born in Gauhati, India, where his father was manager of a tea plantation and has been employed at Lloyds of London. He writes, "The end of 1997 marked my semi-retirement. ... I remain a consultant with my previous employers though I hope this will allow more time for genealogy. I am therefore only too happy to help research, any family members who believe they have British roots (particularly England and Wales). There is a real benefit for me living relatively near London (35 miles) because this naturally has the widest selection of Genealogy in the UK. In particular it is the base of the UK Society of Genealogists of which I am a member. This has an extensive library in the centre of London conveniently near the Public Record Offices which house BDM and census returns for England and Wales." He continues, "I can tell what a lot of work you and your colleagues must do to further the aims of the society and believe me you have my unequivocal support. The rest of this letter may do a little to demonstrate my enthusiasm for this project ... A few weeks ago I passed the 500 I am also investigating my wife's entries mark. antecedents. ... Each of these individual's BDM dates have been documented." Colin tells us that his "Researches over the last 30 years have been mainly directed to the male line of the family who have lived in the London area and South of England 1800 - to the present day. Before that they were located in Leicestershire and Northants, to where they migrated from the Norfolk village of Mautby, pronounced Mawby. Hence some families with the names Mawbey. Mawby and Mabey may be related. This is of course different from the Huguenot derivatives which seem to apply to many of the members of the Society in the USA. ... As you can see I have been busy getting up to speed to qualify as a proper member! ... On the Mabey index I have copied you, several of my Victorian relatives were described as wine merchants or restaurateurs. Only recently I discovered that my great grandfather, William Edward Mabey, and his three brothers owned a chain of restaurants, for over forty years, in the City of London serving the Stock Exchange, Baltic Shipping Exchange and Lloyds where I have worked for over 30 years oblivious of this fact. Some of them even married in churches not a stone's throw from our office."

"The copy of Mabeys Chop House is from a book about Victorian London I found in the Guildhall Library another place full of genealogical data. The references to 'Turtle Merchants' was a puzzle, but have subsequently discovered that by tradition in Victorian times, turtle soup started every banquet at the Lord Mayor of London's residence, the Mansion House. No doubt the Mabeys were proud to be purveyors of the finest turtle soup to the Lord Mayor, perhaps a loss
