MEL BOB MAYBEE #50

He says, "The most eventful thing that happened to GG and Mel this past year (and one of the most eventful of their lives) was being on the jet pilot boat that guided brother Allan Maybee, Roger Melton and Mat Maybee from Astoria, Oregon to the mouth of the Columbia River, across the infamous "bar" and into the Pacific Ocean on July 22, 2001.

This was the conclusion of their historical trip called "Sea to Shining Sea" on three Polaris Genesis Personal watercraft with 1,200 cc engines generating 135 horsepower. Jet skis named after Lewis and Clark and Sacagawea (the young Indian lady who helped Lewis and Clark on their 1804 expedition from St. Louis to Astoria, Oregon.)

They began their epic journey on the

9th of June 2001. (I believe their theme was to join the past with the present and forward into the future.) They began in Biloxi, Mississippi, where the mayor gave them a big send-off by naming that day the *'Maybee and Melton Day'*. A guide helped them cross the Gulf of Mexico to New Orleans where they encountered an unusual and treacherous first tropical storm of the season, "Allison", that caused them to get lost in the Mississippi Delta. So on north to the Missouri River and beginning of the Lewis and Clark journey, continuing north they made a stop at Allan Maybee's hometown of Nebraska City, Nebraska on the 24th of June 2001 and on north and west until the Missouri River ended. Then they went westward on the Jefferson River, portage to Lewiston, Idaho on the Snake River to join the Columbia River and on west to Astoria, Oregon and on out to the Pacific Ocean on 22 July 2001.

This trip was 5,633 miles. Besides most of their journey being upstream they dodged barges and encountered so much debris that authorities temporarily closed part of the Mississippi River after they passed They encountered dense fog, through. thunderstorms, rough water and a tornado, which wiped out their camp in Montana. Some of the world records they set were: 1. The longest trip for jet skis (5,633 miles) 2. The first south to north and west crossing of the United States by jet skis. 3. The first east to west crossing of the United States by jet skis. 4. The first people to travel the entire length of the Missouri River on Jet skis. 5.First to travel from New Orleans to St.

Louis on jet skis. 6.The first Continental crossing by jet skis.

They crossed 16 states in 45 days on this trip. Allan's son, Mat, ended up being chief vehicle driver, coordinator and about everything else. He could really handle that Jet ski."

"Reginald Willfred Maybee, died 8 January 2002 in Rancho Mirage, California. He was born 30 November 1921 in Niagara Falls, New York, the son of Harold Maybee and Addie Beatrice Smith, who were from Trenton, Ontario, Canada. Reg joined the US Army in 1941 while in the National Guard. He went up through the ranks and went to Europe as a Master Sergeant. He was in the Battle of the Bulge and received a battlefield commission of Second Lieutenant. He was hit with machine gun fire during the worst battle and lost his right arm because of it.

He is survived by his widow,

Florence Maybee, of Rancho Mirage, California, daughter, Bonnie Lynn Piersoll of Mesa, Arizona, son Gary Jones of Cypress, California, two grandchildren, Lisa Jones and Michael Jones, brother, Orrin Maybee of Chico, California, sister-in- law, Glady Maybee of Honolulu, many loving nieces and nephews. His body was cremated."


Ruth Sophia Scripture. Nineteen years ago last June she and her husband moved to Slingerlands to be with her widowed daughter, Dora Korn.

The funeral was held from her late home Thursday at 2 p.m. and the body was placed in the vault until spring when internment will be made at Westford.

The funeral was largely attended and a profusion of beautiful flowers attested to the esteem in which she was held.

The officiating minister was the

Rev. Roscoe Tarbox, pastor of the Methodist Episcopal Church, of which she was a member."



James Dana Mabie (May 5, 1827 to April 13, 1909)

"Evansville, April 14, 1909. The death of James D. Mabie, who passed away at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Levi Sperry, last evening at six o'clock, came as a great shock to his relatives and many friends. His death was due to heart failure and he had been ill only a few hours. He was enjoying his usual good health and walked downtown in the forenoon when he was taken with a severe pain in his side. He summoned a carriage and was taken to his home, where he was tenderly nursed and soon was much easier and apparently better.

Shortly before six o'clock his daughter left him and went to the kitchen to prepare his supper and had been gone only a few moments when she heard a moan and found her father dying. Mr. Mabie would have been eighty-two years old had he lived until the fifth of next month. He was born in Schoharie County, New York. In 1849 he was married to Miss Mary Elizabeth Sullivan and in 1857 they came West and settled in Wisconsin near Evansville.

Eight children came to gladden their home, but its happiness was turned to mourning by the death of the wife and mother in 1878. A few years later he married his second wife, Elizabeth Adair, and soon thereafter went to South Dakota where he lived until five years ago when his wife died and he returned to make his home with his daughter, Mrs. Sperry. He was a member of the Methodist Church and his absence will be greatly missed for he was always faithful in attendance at service.

He leaves to mourn his loss; six children, Oscar of Janesville, William of Evansville, Dora, Magnolia, Mrs. Levi Sperry, Evansville, Mrs. Nellie Butler, Oakland, California and Mrs. Nettie Wilcox, Janesville. Funeral services will be held Friday afternoon at two o'clock at the M.E. church and will be conducted under the auspices of the Masonic Order."

John Montagu, 58, 11th Earl of Sandwich, and his son, Orlando, 30, recently set up Earl of Sandwich, a company that makes and delivers sandwiches to the City of London. Lord Sandwich, who sits on the cross-benches in the House of Lords, has worked for Christian Aid and other charities for the past 25 years.

Orlando says, "The popular version of how the sandwich was invented – that our ancestor asked his servant for something he could eat with one hand so he could hold his playing cards with the other – is the story everybody likes to remember, but it's more that he didn't enjoy long social lunches; he was sticking his finger up at convention, choosing to live in a modern way."

His father, John, says, "We'd joked about a sandwich business in the family for ages, but it was Orlando who said, "Why don't we take it seriously?" It's a story that belongs to the family, and we've had to diversify from the old-fashioned estate; it's no longer possible for owners to live like their parents."

<u>WILLIAM MABEE – OBITUARY</u> Martinsville (Morgan Co., Indiana) Republican (May 22, 1906, Page 2, Col. 5)

William Mabee, the oldest child and son of John and Ann Mabee, of Sussex County, New Jersey was born in said county and state on March 8, 1822. He was the only son of a family of five children all of whom are now dead except two sisters, Annie Bowdoin of Rahway, New Jersey, and Susan Williams of Chicago, Illinois. He came from New Jersey to Defiance, Ohio in 1844, returned to New Jersey in 1846 and in November 1846 returned again to Defiance, Ohio.

He was a Mexican soldier and volunteered under President Polk's administration. He enlisted at Toledo, Ohio, in March 1847, and went to Mexico with the army. He was wounded at battle in Mexico on August 20, 1847 and was in the hospital six weeks. (He) was finally honorably discharged from the service in the city of Mexico on December 9, 1847, when he returned to New Jersey.

He was married in Sussex County, New Jersey, his old home, to Catharine Peters on Nov. 2, 1849, where his oldest child, Joseph Mabee was born. He moved with his young family about March 20, 1854 to Defiance, Ohio where he lived till in the fall of that year. He then started for Indiana and came by canal boat from Defiance, Ohio to Peru, Indiana and finally landed in Martinsville, Indiana, November 17 of that year. He lived in Martinsville till December 1865, when he bought the farm three miles northeast of Martinsville, and lived there until June 28, 1898, at which time he and his wife went to live with their daughter, Mrs. Eli Thomas, near the place of their old country home. They lived with the other daughter, Mrs. Ezra Dyer, where his most estimable wife died October 3, 1901 and where he remained until his death, which occurred at 1:15 a.m. Monday, May 21, 1906.

He was a carpenter by trade and many of the oldest and most substantial and prominent residences and other buildings in the city of Martinsville are the work of his hands.

He was elected assessor of Washington Township in 1882 and served a full term. His official life was one marked with nobility, integrity and honor, both to himself and to the people whom he served.

He and his wife were blessed with eight children, 4 boys and 4 girls, three dying in infancy and one daughter Katie who married George Bergman, died near the old home about 22 years ago. The remaining children two boys and two girls, namely: Jacob Mabee of Indianapolis,

Abraham Mabee of Charleston, Illinois, Mrs. Lizzie Thomas, and Mrs. Sarah Dyer reside near the old home place. He left surviving him these four children, fourteen grandchildren and great grandchildren. Such in brief is the life of William Mabee. He was one of the pioneers of this county. He leaves a legacy of a well-spent, long and honorable life. The funeral will be held at the Ezra Dyer home Wednesday afternoon at 1:30. Burial at Hilldale cemetery.

DEATH OF MRS. WILLIAM MABEE

Martinsville Republican (October 4, 1901)

Mrs. William Mabee, living three miles east of the city who was stricken with paralysis some eight weeks ago, died this morning at 10:00.

She was born in New Jersey in 1823, and leaves a husband and four children; Abe Mabee, of Loaring, Illinois, Jacob Mabee, of Indianapolis, Mrs. Elizabeth Thomas and Mrs. Sarah Dyer of this vicinity. Funeral arrangements will be announced in tomorrow's paper."
