The information from the 1910 census (885 families), the 1920 census (906) families and the 1930 census (1143 families), have added quite a bit to our recent histories.

MAYBEE

All men in the United Stated born between 11 June 1872 and 12 Sep 1900, were required to fill out World War I draft registration cards in 1917 and 1918. This will give us verification of information about our fathers and grandfathers and is being transcribed now, and will be added to our database soon.

Check out your ancestors, and if the information is incorrect or incomplete please tell us.

Remember, although we put all data received into the Maybee Society database, we do not put information about living people on our RootsWeb site, nor give it out to the public without permission of the sender. USING THE INTERNET FOR GENEALOGICAL RESEARCH.

The main purpose of this article is to look at different ways of using the Internet for genealogical research. For those people who use the Internet all the time for searches by Google or Yahoo etc., the following short cuts or web links are something that you will be used to. For others not so familiar with the Internet this may appear to be unusual or confusing. For the easy use of these web links, it would be better to receive them via email, then all you would need to do is click/or double click on the web link and the page would open automatically. Otherwise, highlight the one that you want to look at. Then copy and paste it into the address line or type it into the address line.

This article introduces these techniques. No doubt there are those of you who are familiar with web sites that are more focused on your own genealogical research. Some of the web links that have been used, combine historical information from Europe to help in gauging the timing of events, especially for those who are looking at the period directly prior to the colonisation of North America. Also, there are some Internet based language tools to help with translations. However, most of these are limited. Making sense of the translation requires some patience.

N.B. Some of the web sites I have selected have emphasised the **French Huguenots**. This has been included for those interested in this research. However, at this stage there is no proven connection between the Huguenots and the Maybees etc.,

Useful dates in **British history** for the local historian or genealogist. There is a very long list of dates and events. You may need to create a user name, before using this site. This is especially good for French language researchers, as there is an active French genealogical chat forum. An example of surname searches are Mabe (592 entries), Maby (264 entries) which are similar in spelling and phonetics to the English language Maybees etc., Those researching these surname are mainly from France and the United States.

Maybie Crary, but have found nothing about her birth, marriage, death location or even burial place. She is still a mystery woman who was very beautiful. I found many Crary names in the St. Lawrence Co. records where her parents were living when the younger daughters were born but nothing about Leta. Her death date was written on the back of her picture: Dec. 27, 1911, age 32, 11 mos., 27 days. I found her last in the 1900 census with her Halsey family in Mexico, NY; but 1910 (year before she died and when she would have been married) I can't find her at all. I'd love to find her

Loyalists Gather At Adolphustown

Peter W. Johnson U.E., Member #12, writes, "On June 3rd I had the honour of becoming the President of the United Empire Loyalists' Association of Canada, and I assume I am the first Maybee descendant to hold that position."

On June 17th 2006, Loyalist descendants, re-enactors, and friends gathered at Adolphustown ON to mark 'Loyalist Day In Ontario', (which is the 19th), and the 50th anniversary of the Bay of Quinte Branch, UEL Assoc. The Heritage site is just one lot west of where Capt. Abraham Maybee U.E. settled in 1784, and his c1830 house still stands, although derelict.

HAL MAYBEE, POET

Hal Maybee, Member # 296 is the son of Charles Maybee and Pansy Bates, and brother of Mel Bob Maybee. He has received many honors in the field of poetry In 1987 he received honorable mention, Award of Merit, Silver Poet of the Year award and Golden Poet of the year award for the poem, '*Pick A Star*" which was published in *World of Poetry Anthology.* (This award is similar to an actor receiving an Academy Award.)

In 2001 Editors Choice award was given to him for the poem, "*Figment of My Imagination*", which was published in the *Best Poems of 2001* by the *International Library of Poetry* and Poetry.com.

In 2002 he got an Outstanding Achievement Award for the poem, *"Mental Stain, Physical Pain.*"

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ANSWERING QUESTIONS ABOUT THE TAPPAN HOUSE:

Steve Mabie, V.P. – Maybee Society

Several Rockland County (NY) historians have recently raised two questions relating to the Tappan house of Casparus Mabie. This is the house where Major Andre, who conspired with Benedict Arnold, was held during his Court Martial, and it is currently a restaurant known as The Old 76 House. These questions are: (1) Was the house ever used by Casparus Mabie as a tavern? and (2) Was the house owned by Casparus Mabie when Andre was held there?

I was asked if I could help to answer these questions. So, I searched through a few years of the New York Gazette and Weekly Mercury and found several articles that provide answers.

First, we have an advertisement published on June 22, 1772 from which it is clear that Casparus Mabie did, in fact, operate a tavern in Orange Town, as Tappan was then known:

To be fold at public Vendue. It the London Coffee-Moule, on Tuefday the fune, at 12 o'Clock, by the Truffees of the Eftate of the late Treafurer, Dwelling-Houfe and Lot Ground fituate in the Outward of this City, fronting on the main Road, bounded North-Erflerly by a Dwelling-Houfe and Ground lately occupied by Mr. Benjamin Stout, but now by Mr. John Fowler, South-Wefterly by a Dwelling-Houseand Ground now belonging to Garret Cozine, containing in Breadth in Front 74 Feet, in the Rear 84 Feet, and in Length 136-Feets---The Title may be feen by applying to Gerard Bancker, near the Exchange. Alfo to be fold at public Vendue at the Houfe of Cafparus Mabie, Tavern-keeper, in Orange . Town, on Friday the 3d Day of July next, the following Parcels of Land (late the Property of Abraham De Peyfter, Efg; deceafed) fituate at the South End of the Hills at Tappan, or Orange Town, to wit. One fourth Part of a Lot known by the Name of Lot No. 11, which one One-fourth contains 17 - Acres. One fourth Part of another Lot known by the Name of Lot No. 13. which One-fourth contains 16 & Acres.

Next, we have an advertisement from April 5, 1773 for the sale of the Orange Town property then owned by Casparus Mabie:

To be fold at public Vendue, On the 21st inftant, at nine o'clock in the morning. THE well noted houfe of Cafparus Mabie, fituate in Orange town; it has four rooms with 3 fire-places, and a large entry on the first floor, and is very convenient for a merchant or tavern-keeper, having been tenanted to perfons in this public bufinefs for many years ; there is alfo a good chaife-houfe, and garden. Likewife two acres and a half of very good upland, with a houfe and barn thereon, adjoining the above; and one acre of meadow . fronting faid house, with a shop thereon. The conditions will be made known on the day of fale, and an indifputable title given. N. B. At the fame time will also be fold a good copper brew kettle that will contain feven barrels; with fome houshold furniture too tedious to mention.

Finally, there are a series of advertisements, the first of which appeared on February 26, 1776 for the sale of the house formerly owned by Casparus Mabie:

To be fold at private S A LE, THAT noted house and lot where Casparus Mabie formerly lived, at Tappan, two miles from the North-River, and twenty-four from Hoebuck ferry: It is a convesiont flone building, four rooms on a floor...-There is likewise on faid place a good barn, garden, and fundry other conveniencies. Whoever inclines to purchase may apply to Mrs. Elizabeth Herring, on the premises, Mr. Cornelius C. Roofevelt, at New-York, or to Doctor G. Soner, in Morris County.

So, we now have evidence that (1) The Tappan house was, in fact, used by Casparus Mabie as a tavern; and (2) The Tappan house was not, in fact, owned by Casparus Mabie when Major Andre was held there during his trial.

I was then asked if I had any proof as to where the so-called Orange Town Resolutions of July 4, 1774 were passed. Was it in this same building? As found in an article published in the New York Journal of July 14, 1774, the answer is no. The Orange Town Resolutions were passed in the house of Joost Mabie, a brother of Casparus: At a Meeting of the Freeholders and Inhabitants of Orange Town, in the County of Orange, and Province of New-York, on Monday the fourth Day of July, 1974. at the Houfe of Mr. Yoast Mabie, in Said Town, the following Refolves were agreed upon and paffed, viz.

rft. HAT we are and ever with to be, true and loyal Subjects to his Majefty George the Third, King of Great-Britain.

ad. That we are most cordially disposed to Support his Majesty and defend his Crown and Dignity, in every constitutional Measure, as far as lies in our Power.

3d. That however well difpofed we are toward his Majefty, we cannot fee the late Acts of Parilament impofing Duties upon us; and the Act for flutting up the Port of Bofton, without declaring our Abhorreace of Meafures fo unconflictutional and big with Deftruction.

4th. That we are in Duty bound to use every just and lawful Measure, to obtain a Repeal of Acts, not only destructive to us, but which of course must diffres Thousands in the Mother Country.

sth. That it is our unanimous Opinion, that the ftopping all Exportation and Importation, to and from Great Britain, and the Weft Indies, would be the most eff. ctual Method to obtain a speedy Repeal.

6th. That it is our most ardent Wish to see Cencord and Harmony restored to England and her Colonics.

7th. That the following Gentlemen, to wit, Col. Abraham Lent, John Haring, Efq; Mr. Thomas Outwater, Mr. Gardiner Jones, and Peter T. Haring, Efq; be a Committee for this Town, to correfpond with the City of New-York; and to conclude and agree upon fuch Measures as they shall judge necessary, in order to obtain a Repeal of faid Acts.
