Research Update

One of the earliest efforts I undertook as part of my genealogical study of the Mabie Family was to make a list of all of the Mabie Heads of Household who were enumerated in the 1790 US Federal Census. To that end, Nancy and I went through several reels of microfilm and found 38 such enumerations in two states, New York and Maine.

Note that New Jersey is not included because, before the census forms were consolidated in Washington, DC, a fire in Trenton had destroyed all of the New Jersey forms from 1790 – 1820. We now believe that there were as many as 7 households of Mabie families in New Jersey in 1790, with two in Sussex County (John Mabee and Jasper Mabie) and up to five in Harrington Township, Bergen County.

Clearly, there were also several families in Canada by 1790, but the earliest Canadian census were enumerated several years later.

Over the ensuing years of research, progress has been made toward identifying each of these enumerated households, and in this update we will identify each one as well as possible.

Throughout the rest of this article, in parentheses after each name is the actual enumeration in the form of (a-b-c-d-e) where "a" is the number of free, white males 16 and over and heads of family, "b" is the number of free, white males under 16, "c" is the number of free white females and heads of families, "d" is all other free persons, and "e" is the number of slaves. An "*" means that the entry is unreadable.

Most if not all of the unreadable entries were because the left side of the census forms were torn and missing. Thus, it is the slaves column which is most often missing. This is not intentional. The MS# is the Maybee Society data base number for this person.

Washington County, Maine

Elias and Solomon are two of the sons of the Loyalist Jacob Maybee. Jacob with his sons Elias, Solomon and William, removed to New Brunswick after the Revolution. As luck would have it, the land settled by Jacob and William was in Charlotte County, NB, while the land settled by Elias and Solomon was just across the international border. Elias and Solomon were grandsons of the Loyalist Simon Mabee and grandsons of Caspar Mabie.

Albany County, New York

John and Aaron (also known as Arent) were two of the sons of Pieter Mabee and Susanna Vedder, while Hester Groot Mabee was the widow of their cousin Cornelius Mabee, who had died in 1789. Cornelius was a son of Jacob Mabee and this is the entry for the Mabee Farm. All three were grandsons of Jan Mabee.

Abraham, Peter and John were the three sons of Abraham Mabie and Sylvia Coquillet, while Daniel was the eldest son of Peter. Further north, in the Town of Beekman, lived Tobias Maybee, son of Jeremias Mabie and Mary Clemens. All are descendants of Caspar Mabie.

Albert was the son of Abraham Mabee and Annetje Vedder, while Hermanus was the son of Pieter Mabee and Susanna Vedder. Dolly Mabee is Dorothea Pikkert Mabee. By the time of this census, she was the widow of John Mabee, and the mother of several children, including the above named Joseph and his brothers Jacobus and Lewis Mabee. David Mabee is the eldest son of Joseph.

New York County in 1790 consisted of Manhattan Island which was divided into wards. Frederick is a son of Johannes Mabie and Susanna Bertine. Peter (also known as Petrus), Cornelius and Jacob were sons of Johannes Mabie and Phebe Ferdon.

The Maybee Society data base does not identify Henry's parents. However, it is possible, if not probable, that this Henry is the son of Jeremias Mabie and Anna Namburg, who is separately listed as #3685 in the data base.

Abraham was a son of Jeremias Mabie and Anna Namburg. Deliverance was a son of Deliverence Mabie and Catherine Clemens. John and Stephen were brothers, the sons of John Mabie and his wife who is known only as Peasons, believed to be a corruption of Passion. Thus, Deliverence, John and Stephen were all grandsons of Jeremias Mabie. Finally, Silas was a son of the Loyalist Simon Mabee. Silas had recently returned from Canada.

Orange County, which at the time consisted of what is now both Orange and Rockland Counties, was the home to the largest number of Mabie families in the 1790 census. Jacob Mabee lived to the west in Warwick, just a stone's throw from his brother John (MS#4375), who lived in Sussex County, New Jersey. Jacob and John were sons of John Mabee and Susanna Coutent, and thus grandsons of Simon Mabee.

Jasper Mabie, who was also known as Casparus Mabie, was living in Haverstraw. He was a son of Johannes Mabie and Susanna Bertain.

There were 11 other families, all living in Orange Town, in or near the village of Tappan. These included Joost (MS#527) and Abraham (MS #528), two of the sons of Peter Mabie and Katalyntje Bogart; Abraham's (MS#528) sons Peter A. (MS#3176), Cornelius Van Arelant (MS#3174) and Casparus (MS#3175); Cornelius (MS#3986) and Abraham

(MS#4032), sons of Casparus Mabie and Willemptie Eckerson; Johannis (MS#4201), son of Peter J. Mabie and Mary Bell; John J. (MS#1153), a son of Johannes Mabie and Phebe Ferdon, and Peter C. (MS#2242), son of Cornelius Mabie and Elizabeth Lent.

That leaves as unidentified only the John P. Mabie enumerated in Orange Town with a large household of 10, including 3 males 16 and over, 3 males under 16 and 4 females. It is possible that this is MS#3361, a son of Peter Mabie and Janet Hogenkamp, but he is believed to have been living in Harrington Township, Bergen County, New Jersey both before and after the 1790 enumeration. It is also possible that the enumerator made a mistake in recording his middle initial. This uncertainty prevents his positive identification.

Another War of 1812 Veteran Remembered

In the last issue there was a brief report on Peter Maybee (1775-c1830) and the War of 1812 Veteran marker placed in his memory at Stockdale Cemetery, north of Trenton, ON. His brother Abraham Jr. (1777-1862) is also buried there and is likely a veteran too. Our subject this time is their half-brother Isaac Maybee.

Loyalist Capt. Abraham Maybee married Gerritje Hogenkamp, who died prior to 1781. Peter and Abraham Jr. were two of their three children. In 1781, Abraham married widow Ann Ackerman, thought to have been Antje Storr, married to Loyalist Albert Ackerman, who died while serving in the New Jersey Volunteers. Abraham and Ann had three children including Isaac.

Isaac was born in Adolphustown ON after 1786 and baptized in 1791. By the

way, Adolphustown was one of several townships in Ontario which were named after children of His Majesty King George III. Secondary sources place Isaac's death at 1813 or 1814. He served as a corporal in Capt. Nicholas Hagerman's Company of the Lennox County Militia. He last appears on a Muster Roll ending on March 28, 1813, and not listed on the next one beginning in late April. It would appear he died during that time period. Lennox County was not an area subject to major battles in the manner the Niagara area was. so chances are Isaac did not die in combat. If he were buried locally, it would likely be at the Anglican Cemetery in Adolphustown, where his sister Elizabeth Harris (1787-1841) has a marker, and where his father Capt. Abraham is likely buried. It would be nice to place a Veteran marker at his burial site, but until a location is determined, that is not going to occur.

Mabee was also the chairman of the Mabee Foundation, which has given financial help to many organizations in Midland and other organizations within Texas and around the United States.

He is survived by his wife, his four children, 17 grandchildren and 28 great grandchildren.
