Research Update

We have known for several years that Cornelius Mabey (son of Johannes Mabie and Phoebe Ferdun), a cart man in New York City during the 1790s, died intestate in 1795. And we have also known that his widow, Elizabeth Mabey, died in April 1797, leaving 4 orphans. Unfortuneately, we have not known Elizabeth's maiden

name, nor have we known with any certainty the names or ages of their 4 children.

We know, for example, that in the 1790 census, Cornelius and Elizabeth had two daughters. We also have identified a John Maybay, born in New York in 1790 or 1791, who in 1850 was living in Hancock County, Illinois, who we THINK was possibly a son of Cornelius and Elizabeth. But beyond that, we have known nothing.

However, thanks to Charles Boetsch, (Maybee Society Member #359), we now know a little more. As it happens, Charles was viewing an LDS microfilm containing baptism records of the Presbyterian Church in New York City, one of the few such microfilms that I have never viewed, when he found a record for the baptism of a Mary Mabey, born April 5, 1788 and baptized on June 1, 1788. Her parents were listed as Cornelius Mabey and Elizabeth Carroway, his wife.

Thus, we now know Elizabeth Mabey's maiden name (probably spelled Caraway), and one of the two daughters enumerated in the 1790 census. Interestingly, the John Maybay in the 1850 census had a daughter named Mary (and a son named Obediah).

Charles also verified that Cornelius was buried in the North Dutch Church in New York City on Ocotber 24, 1795.

So, thank you Charles for these great finds.

The End of an Era

As this issue was going to press, word came that the Ringling Brothers Barnum and Bailey Circus was going out of business this year, after 146 years of entertaining children of all ages, myself included.

I am sure that all of you have heard of the Mabie Brothers Circus, owned by Edmund F. and Jeremiah Mabie, which toured the United States between 1840 and the early 1860s, long before Ringling and Barnum. Only the Civil War caused the Mabie's to close the show. So, in memory of Jeremiah, Edmund and Romeo (their star elephant), page 6 is an excerpt from a Little Rock newspaper from 1851.

Maybee & Related Grave Markers #2

Catherine Maybee, c1814-1852

Catherine Maybee is buried at Stockdale Cemetery a few miles north of Trenton, ON. Stockdale has over 1200 markers, is well kept and still in use. The earliest surviving marker is dated 1836, but there were burials there before that date and certainly Maybee involvement. If one considers the actual Maybee markers plus those of descendants who may not carry the name, the most common surname is Maybee.

Catherine's husband Ephraim Maybee c1809-1874 was a grandson of Loyalist Capt. Abraham Maybee. Ephraim married Catherine in 1831 and they had nine known children and it's more than probable that Catherine's early death was childbirth-related. Catherine's maiden name was Gunter and she as well was the grandchild of a Loyalist - Conrad Gunter. Her branch of the Gunters had arrived in Upper Canada from New Brunswick about 1811.

Coincidentally Catherine's brother Samuel married Sarah Maybee sister of Ephraim

and Sarah also died in 1852 of childbirth issues. Sarah has a marker at another cemetery. There were other marriages between the Gunters and Maybees too.

Catherine's marker is fairly simple in design, but the letters are done with a boldness typical of the 1850s. The weeping willow motif was a symbol of mourning and had begun to appear in the 1820s and until the end of the 1860s it was easily the most popular grave marker motif.

The one odd thing about this marker is the "Mabee" spelling. This branch of the Maybees always included the "y" in the name, so I can only assume the artisan seeing that he was short on room for the surname, introduced a little streamlining by leaving out that letter!

Tweaking Barbara Maybee 1819-1885

A few newsletters ago, there was a short article titled, "Did William Huff Maybee Marry A Second Time?" (July 2016, Issue 106). Since then a little more information has surfaced.

The suggestion at the time was that Barbara (CANE) LEROY 1819-1885 was the second wife of William Huff MAYBEE rather than some other William MAYBEE. She was buried as the widow of a William MAYBEE.

Barbara is included in numerous public family trees on *Ancestry.ca*. Yes. I am aware that such trees are often problematic, but they can be worth a glance. In every case Barbara turns up as "KEENE" rather than "CANE". I suspect that her maiden name may well have been KEENE, and the appearance of CANE on some documents can be attributed to the people who wrote the entries, and their interpretation of what they heard.

Barbara turns up in the 1861 and 1871 Census Records for Sidney Township, Hastings County ON. Oddly in 1861 she is called "Margaret" rather than "Barbara" but all indications are that this is the same Barbara. The children match as well. She is a widow in both records, so her husband John LEROY died prior to 1861, and the public member trees offer the year 1860. That's a bit earlier than previously thought.

George LEROY married Sarah CRONK on Dec. 19, 1872. His Mother is listed as "Barbara Cane". His residence at the time was Frankford which is within Sidney Township. This and Census Records all place the family in Frankford or vicinity and this places them almost in the same neighbourhood as William Huff MAYBEE.

Thus despite tweaking the information a bit, I still suspect that Barbara married William Huff MAYBEE in 1871 or later.
