Number three, back to extended families and their cemeteries in this upstate NY area. After discussing the Slingerland Family Cemetery, I started researching many of the other family cemeteries connected with the

Mabee/Maybee/Mabie/Mabey branches. There is a whole list of them! I had no idea of all the small family burial grounds in the area. New York state law says that if a cemetery like that has been abandoned, i.e., all the descendants have moved away, that the towns are obligated to care for them. I just went through a multiyear process of working with our town's people in moving some stones from an old van Patten mini cemetery, near the town dump. I was quite satisfied in how they handled it, and felt it was a very appropriate resolution. So a listing of many of the original names from Schenectady, connections to Jan's branch are Peck, Peek, Truax, van Patten, van Petten, van Eps, van Slyke, van Vechten, van Voast, Vedder, Veeder, Visscher, Vrooman, Yates, Wemple, and Glen/Sanders.

From Caspar's branches there seems to be quite a few under the names Blauvelt, Bogart, and Conklin.

There is also a Mabie farm cemetery in Sullivan, Madison county New York. It is interesting, of the 2 stones listed, one is a Van Antwerp but no Mabie! There is a Mabie family cemetery in Portageville, Wyoming County, New York with 4 stones and 3 are Mabies (Daniel G. Mabie, his wife Rachel Booth Mabie, and Harriet Mabie, daughter of Elias). And lastly, an abandoned Gunter-Maybee cemetery, in Murray, Northumberland, Ontario, Canada. The funny thing is, in researching this, I found a small Vrooman cemetery right in Niskayuna that is not yet on Find A Grave.

Research Update

We continue to encourage those of you who find new information on your families to let us know about it. For the last edition, we had a submittal by Edward Maby (MS #75) on Harriet A. Mabie (#1168). For this edition, Harmon Hurren (MS #416) has submitted his new research on:

Abigail Mabee (#1294)

First some background. Abigail Mabee was born April 26, 1814, the daughter of Oliver Mabee and his wife, Mary Smith. We knew all along that Abigail married David Cowan on May 7, 1836 at Walsingham, Norfolk County, Upper Canada. And we had previously identified her in the 1861Canadian census with her second husband, David Bone, in Lansdown Township, Leeds County, Ontario. But we had no information at all about any possible Cowan or Bone children from either marriage. Through his research, Harmon has added 4 Cowan children and one Bone child to our extended family.

1. Oliver David Cowan, born 1838 in Gananoque to David Cowan and Abigail Cowan. His marriage record says he is the son of David and Abigail Cowan, married Julia Eliza Britton 19 Sep 1861 in Leeds, Ontario. In the 1861 census, he is O. D. Cowan, 24, living with his sister, Jane, 21, and her husband, Freeman Britton, 25, their son, Albert, 4, and Collin Cowan, 19 (another brother). Oliver D. Cowan died 9 Oct 1896 in Gananoque.

2. Jane Narcissa Cowan, born abt 1840. She is Jane Britton, 21, in the 1861 census (married to Freeman Britton, referenced above); Jane Button (Britton), 31, in the 1871 census - married to Freeman Button with Albert, 13, Byron, 10, Mary, 8, and George, 5; Narcissa Britton in the 1881 census, 41, with Freeman, 45, Albert, 24, Byron, 20, Laura, 18, George, 15, and Nannie, 7. Jane Cowan is listed as their mother in the marriage records of Byron Oliver, Mary Laura, and Annie as well as in the death record of Albert Freeman Britton.

3. David Colin Cowan, born 11 Apr 1842 in Gananoque. A Wesleyan Methodist Baptismal Register lists David Colin Cowan, born 11 Apr 1842 in Pittsburgh, baptized 22 Aug 1846 in Gananoque, father is David Cowan, mother is Abigail. He is Colin Cowan in the 1861 census (referenced above), Colin Cowan in the 1881 census, born 1842 in Ontario, married, living with Harriet Cowan, 40, Edith, 16, Freeman, 13, Pauline, 5, and Julia, 1. Census record shows Edith and Freeman born in USA, others in Ontario. Rosie Lappin, 18, is living with them as a servant. David Colin Cowan is listed in the birth and marriage record of Shirley Britton Cowan (she was born 1882).

4. Finally, there is a Find a Grave record of Margaret A Cowan, born May 1841, died 12 Jul 1842; daughter of David Cowan and Abigail Mabee. She is buried in Vittoria Baptist Cemetery in Vittoria, Norfolk, Ontario. After the death of David Cowan, Abigail married David Bone (Bowen in one census). In the 1861 census record which is included in the Society listing, she is with David Bone. Also listed are David Bone, 18, b in Scotland, Elin, 16, Margrit, 11, and Mary, 5. It is possible that David is David Colin Cowan (birth year matches, but he wasn't born in Scotland – could be census taker error since David Bone, the father, is b in Scotland), and Mary is Mary Isabella Cowan (listed next), but I have no idea who Elin and Margrit are. The 1871 census lists David Bone, 59, Abigail Bone, 57, and Mary Bone, 15.

5. Mary Isabella Bone, born January, 1856 in Gananoque. Her marriage record lists Mary Isabella Bone, 22, daughter of David Bone and Abigail Maybee, married Charles Byron Rogers, 24, married 20 March 1878 in Gananoque. Mary Isabella and Charles are listed as parents in the birth records of Elizabeth May, Edith Mable, and Arthur Nelson. The 1901 Leeds census lists Charles B. and Mary I. Rogers with Elizabeth M., Edith M, and Arthur N.D. Rogers

Switching Gears Again

I recently was asked if there was anything new on a possible link between our family and either the Van Norden or Van Orden families. The short answer is no, and the longer answer is that there will not be anything new. The existing research, primarily conducted by Ethel K. Kolenut in 1997, was dispositive in this respect. Ethel proved that the progenitor of the Van Norden family was Pieter Wesselszen, who married Josyntje Jans on 19 May 1669 in the New York City Dutch Reformed Church. Ethel also showed that the progenitor of the Van Orden family was Jan Van Orden and his wife Lysbeth Andries Rees. The Van Orden family is found in the New York Lutheran Church records and the Hackensack and Schraalenburg church Records in Bergen County, New Jersey, in the exact same time frame that the records of Jan Pieterse Mabee and Anna Borsboom are found in Schenectady. The error which originally connected all of these families was made by Edward C. Marshall and promulgated in published works by Sarah Adelaide Mabie and Theodore Van Norden in the 1920s.

The one family that is directly connected to ours is the Tietsoort Family, with modern spellings Titsworth, Ditsworth and Teachout, all descended from Willem Tietsoort, the half-brother of Jan and Caspar.

<u>The Upcoming Maybee</u> <u>Society Reunion</u>
