Research Update

Sometimes new information just falls into your lap from unexpected sources. That is

exactly what happened to me earlier this month.

The San Antonio Genealogical and Historical Society was preparing for an upcoming seminar and, as president, I had to contact our speaker, Dr. Michael D. Lacopo, who was flying in from Indiana and finalize his travel arrangements. I was not prepared for his reply.

It turns out that Mike had recently uncovered a new branch in his personal ancestry that led to a family in the Mohawk Valley. Specifically, one of Mike's ancestors is a Gerrit VanSlyck who was baptized in the Schenectady Reformed Church in 1729. The surprise came when Mike told me that he was fairly certain that he had identified the previously unidentified wife of this Gerrit VanSlyck as a member of the Mabee Family.

Astute observers will observe that in the Maybee Society Tree there is already a Gerrit VanSlyck who married Anna Mabee, daughter of Joseph Mabee. As it happens, this Gerrit was born in 1767, a son of earlier Gerrit VanSlyck and his unknown wife. Thus this second couple are a full generation apart from the Gerrit that Mike is researching.

Over the next two weeks, we exchanged information which led me to have a high level of confidence in the breadth of Mike's research and the quality of his analysis.

Mike's proof relating to his ancestors is very well done but it is also irrelevant to this article. Suffice it to say that he demonstrates that the senior Gerret VanSlyck and his wife had a family of 7 children:

1. Martin, b.c. 1753;

- 2. Jacobus, b.c. 1756;
- 3.Lena, b.c. 1758;
- 4. Engeltje, b.c. 1760;
- 5. George, b.c. 1762;
- 6. Nicholas born October 20, 1764, baptized Oct. 24, 1764 (Stone Arabia Reformed Church); and
- 7. Gerrit, born August 30, 1767, baptized Sep. 14, 1767 (Stone Arabia Reformed Church).

Mike's ancestor in this family is Engeltje (Angelica) who married Jacob Shaver on June 11, 1782.

So, what exactly is known about the unknown wife? Well, the one answer that is easy to ascertain is that her first name was Echje. This name is found in the 1764 baptism record of her child Nicholas in the Stone Arabia Reformed Church.

If this name looks familiar to Maybee Society members, it should. Or at least variations of that name. Echie is one of several variations that appear in the old Dutch Church records. Other variations include Aechtje, Achtje, Aecht, Aeche, Achien, Eegfe, Eggie and Egien. Now, here is the odd part about this name. Dutch scholars will tell you that the name Aecht is Dutch for the English name Agatha. But for some reason, in the Maybee Family, people who appear in records with these variations were never named Agatha. Instead, they were always named Eve or Eva. Think Jan's daughter Eve Mabee who married Cornelius Slingerlandt. Or Eva the daughter of Peter Van Antwerpen and Engeltie Mabee, or Eva Claussen, the wife of Bartholomew Pickert and the mother of Dorothy Pickert.

So where are we going with all of this? As it happens, there is one particular Achien Mabee for whom absolutely nothing is

known except for the fact that she was born and baptized in 1730, the daughter of Jan Pieterse Mabee and Dorothy Pickert.

Note that this Achien (or perhaps Eve) would be a sister of Joseph Mabee, whose daughter Dorothy married Peter Marsh.

Which brings us to Mike's ancestor, Jacob Shaver and his wife Angelica (or Engeltje) VanSlyck. In 1848, Jacob was asked to provide a deposition to support a claim for the descendants of Peter Marsh and Dorothy Mabee. This deposition is found in the files under the Marsh pension request. Jacob was asked simply to support the fact that Peter Marsh had married Dorothy Mabee. Jacob stated that he "well remembered the time of his (Peter's) marriage to Dorothy, who bore the maiden name Mabee, and was a cousin to the wife of this deponent."

So, according to Jacob's deposition, his wife, Engeltje VanSlyck Shaver, was a cousin of Dorothy Mabee Marsh.

How can this be? We know that Dorothy's parents were Joseph Masbee and Catherine Schuyler, and we also know that Engeltje's parents were Gerrit VanSlyck and his unknown wife Echtje (MS #5195). There are no known links between Gerrit VanSlyck's ancestors and either the Mabee or Schuyler Families, so the only logical conclusion is that the relationship is between Echtje VsanSlyck and eiher the Mabee or Schuyler Families.

There are no known females on the Schuyler side with the name Eve. But we do have exactly one Eve on the Mabee side that has never been identified beyond her birth, and that is Achien (MS #5128), Joseph Mabee's sister.

So, we have a possible solution to the puzzle of Echje VanSlyck, and that is she was the daughter of Jan Pieterse Mabee and Dorothy Pickert, baptized in 1730.

Does this constitute a proof? Not in and of itself, but knowing that there is a possible solution to the puzzle goes a long way. Mike has more to add to this, but that is his story. For now, I'll welcome him into the Maybee Society and look forward to reading more about his research.
