My patronymic Mabie ancestor was Catherine Mabie (1703-1740), daughter of Caspar Mabie (1660-1720)Pieterszen and granddaughter of Pieter Casparszen van Naerden (1600-1653). Catherine lived in New Rochelle and married Daniel Sicard (1698-1765). Several of her twelve children, including my fifth great grandmother, Marie Sicard (Secord) Beebe (1736-1838), were Lovalists who relocated to Canada during the tumultuous aftermath of the Revolutionary War. My great-grandfather returned to the United States in the 1880s and settled in Minnesota where I spent my early years.

Dutch History in Manhattan

On February 2, 2023, a few stout souls braved the cold in Lower Manhattan to gather on the steps of City Hall to commemorate the 370th anniversary of the New Amsterdam Municipal Charter.

On February 2, 1653, when the Charter of New Amsterdam established the colony's municipal government, Pieter Casparszen van Naerden was an influential citizen in the diverse entrepreneurial trading community of 800 residents who spoke 18 different languages.

The new Charter was the culmination of efforts by colonists' demands for a municipal government empowering local officials to resolve disputes and manage affairs for the colony rather than relying solely on the Dutch West Indies Company board of directors in Holland.

This was the beginning of municipal selfgovernance in Manhattan. The YouTube commemorative video of the Charter features a Frank Sinatra *New York!
