# America 250 and the New Netherland 400

Exciting news! Just last week I listened to a zoom by Russell on the brand-new exhibit in the New York (city) Historical Society. The title is "New York Before New York: The Castello Plan of New Amsterdam" here is the link,

I would love to see it in person. It is only up until July 14 of this year!

"On the occasion of the 400th anniversary of the Dutch founding of a colony that would give rise to New York, this special installation is organized around the Castello Plan, a map depicting New Amsterdam around the peak of its settlement circa 1660, just before the English took control. While modest in size, the map—on loan from the Biblioteca Medicea Laurenziana in Florence provides a remarkably rare glimpse of everyday life in New Amsterdam revealing a complex colony of about 1,500 people at the southern tip of the island of Mannahatta. The installation unpacks the Plan, highlighting the remarkable global reach of the tiny settlement, its dense mix of ethnicities and languages, the Dutch ideas of tolerance that undergirded it, and the dark legacies of slavery and of the dispossession of Native Americans that it relied upon. Through documents and objects, and a 3D model, the installation explores how settlers, Indigenous people, and enslaved Africans experienced the world illustrated in the Castello Plan. Curated by Russell Shorto, director, New Amsterdam Project. Virtual Castello Plan produced by the New Amsterdam History Center. With special thanks to the New Netherland Institute, the New Netherland Research Center at the New York State Office of Cultural Education, Dr. Barbaro Martinez-Ruiz, Laura Ten Eyck, Dr. Andrew Lipman, and Dr. Joseph Diamond."


#### Reunion

### Maybees/Meebies/Mabees/Mabies Through History

I would sure like to know for sure which Mr Meebie was the one who conducted business with George Washington on his trip through the Mohawk valley in 1783!! An author I heard and met a number of years ago, Norman J. Bollen, wrote "George Washington and the Mohawk Frontier". He told me about the documents he found in the Washington papers in Virginia doing research for his book. He wrote in the book he thought it was a Mabie tavern on the north side of the river opposite the farm. I am not so sure. That may have been the Swart tavern he stopped at but there was a John and Arent Mabee who had a farm there, (born 1728/39 and served as privates in the Rev War) sons of Jan's son Peter. Perhaps it was their father's land that they inherited from him and Jan.

The 16 shillings and 9 pence must have been for something good!!?? Orrr could it have been in town for something done by Abraham's son Albert, a member of the Sons of Liberty!? I guess there is no way to know at this point in time. Sad. But it was wonderful of Norm to be so generous and share the documents with us! He said he found it in dal Verme's Journal "Memoradum of Cash" where he kept accounts for GW. Norm also has Maybee ancestors, Hester, daughter of John who married Brigadier General Henry Adam Fonda in Schenectady and lived out toward the town of Fonda. So, it might even be possible it was one of the Mabees out there.


This effort has been very helpful for me. My grandparents are part of the Maybee tree, and I am as well.


We do it every March 29<sup>th</sup>, the recognized Vietnam War date. Next year, 2025 is the last year this program is available!
